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KEYNOTE SPEAKER

The Most Reverend Bishop Ryan Jimenez



Ryan Pagente Jimenez was born in Dumaguete City, Philippines on December 18, 1971 to Rogelio and Lilia Jimenez, and was raised on the island of Siquijor with his three siblings. While a student at Saint Joseph Seminary during the 80s, Jimenez discovered his aspiration to become a priest.

He moved to Quezon City and earned his Bachelor's degree in Pre-Divinity at the Ateneo de

Manila University in 1992. From 1993-1995, he taught at the Sacred Heart School for Boys, a Jesuit high school in Cebu City.

He later furthered his studies in California at Saint Patrick's Seminary & University, earning a Bachelor in Sacred Theology (S.T.B.), Master's degree in Divinity, and Master's degree in Theology. Bishop Ryan is currently pursuing a doctoral degree at Fordham University's Graduate School of Religion and Religious Studies.

He first served the Diocese of Chalan Kanoa as a teacher at Eskuelan San Francisco de Borja Catholic school on Rota back in 1995. He served in that capacity for two years, after which he continued his studies for the priesthood as a diocesan seminarian.

Bishop Jimenez had his sacerdotal ordination at Our Lady of Mount Carmel Cathedral for the Diocese of Chalan Kanoa on June 8, 2003. His first assignment took him to Kristo Rai parish. He was later transferred to Our Lady of Mount Carmel Cathedral parish to serve as its Rector. Since then, he has served his beloved diocese in numerous capacities including as Chancellor, Presbyteral Council member, Personal Secretary to the Bishop, Superintendent of Catholic Schools, Editor-in-Chief for North Star, the weekly diocesan newspaper, adjunct faculty member at Mount Carmel School, and many other ministerial appointments.

On December 28, 2010, Pope Benedict XVI appointed Bishop Jimenez as Apostolic Administrator for the Diocese of Chalan Kanoa. He took on this important governance role vacated by the resignation of the late Bishop Emeritus Tomas A. Camacho on April 6, 2010, at age 76, and the untimely death of then-Apostolic Administrator Very Reverend Manuel R. Corcuera that same year.

After almost six years of vacancy, Pope Francis appointed him as Bishop on June 24, 2016. His Episcopal Ordination and Installation was held at the Our Lady of Mount Carmel Cathedral on August 14, 2016. The principal consecrator was Archbishop Savio Hon Tai-Fai, S.D.B, then-Apostolic Administrator of the Archdiocese of Agana in Guam, and then-Secretary for the Congregation of the Evangelization of Peoples. Co-consecrators were Bishop Tomas A. Aguon, then-Bishop Emeritus of Chalan Kanoa, and Bishop Julito B. Cortes (Bishop Ryan's former high school teacher), Bishop of the Diocese of Dumaguete, Philippines.

Bishop Jimenez episcopacy is centered on shepherding all the Catholic faithful in the Diocese of Chalan Kanoa towards becoming joyful missionary disciples, following his chosen call Volumus Iesum Videre, "We would like to see Jesus." (John 12:21)

Antonio U. Piailug

Preservation of Traditional Cultural Practices



Antonio "Tony" Urmeyang Piailug is a Carolinian Master Canoe Builder and Master Navigator of the Weriyeng school of navigation. He began his training as a young boy on Satawal and has been building canoes and sailing for over 40 years. He now resides in Saipan where he is part of the Canoe Federation. His work is now focused on perpetuating

the art and knowledge of canoe building and wayfinding through teaching and mentoring here in the CNMI and Guam. Piailug co-manages Department of Community and Cultural Affairs' Seafaring Traditions. The program built the Guma Hegai at Civic Center in Susupe, where Piailug is leading the carving of a voyaging canoe. Prior to this Saipan canoe project, he completed the Sakman Fanhigåyan in Guam and sailed the canoe to Saipan and back. He also teaches canoe building and wayfinding at the Piailug Seafaring Academy in Guam.

Dr. Sylvia C. Frain

Research and Publications in the Humanities



Dr. Sylvia C. Frain has been living, studying, and working in Oceania for over twenty years. She has nurtured deep, long-term relationships with local elders and educators in Micronesia, as well as knowledge holders and researchers beyond Oceania. Since 2013, Dr. Frain has lived in New Zealand where she has been dedicated to regional

interconnections and international efforts of decolonization and demilitarization. Dr. Frain has made a major contribution to the field of humanities research in the region, having (co)published over ten quality-assured, peer-reviewed academic articles; book chapters; web blogs; and has additional forthcoming works. With support from a Northern Mariana Humanities Council grant, she e-published her thesis "Fanohge Famalåo'an & Fan'tachu Fama'lauan: Women Rising! Indigenous Resistance to Militarization in the Marianas Archipelago," available for free through *Guampedia*.



Walt F.J. Goodridge

Research and Publications in the Humanities; Preservation of CNMI History; and Outstanding Humanities Teacher



Walt F.J. Goodridge is originally from the island of Jamaica, West Indies, and holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Civil Engineering from Columbia University. He has lived on Saipan since 2006. Beginning in that year until 2010, he wrote a weekly business/inspirational column in the Saipan Tribune titled "The Saipanpreneur Project." The column encouraged readers to use their talents, cultural worldview, and more as the

basis for a means of economic survival.

He has authored the following seven books about Saipan history and culture: Chicken Feathers & Garlic Skin: Diary of a Chinese Garment Factory Worker on Saipan with Chun Yu Wang; Saipan Living: a relocation guide; There's Something About Saipan; Saipan Now!; From Bugle Boy to Battleship with Battle of Saipan veteran Lloyd Glick; Drinking Seawater with Riza Oledan-Ramos; and "Amelia Earhart on Saipan" (a tour souvenir booklet). He has also provided "WWII Pilgrimage Tours" to military personnel, researchers, families and even Battle of Saipan veterans.

His "Passion Profit" seminars, "Saipan Writers" workshops, "Vegan Living" cooking demonstrations, and career-focused school visits have highlighted his role as an educator. Walt also launched welovesaipan.com (alongside 20 other Saipan-related sites) to respond to the negative information about Saipan that existed online.

Catherine R. Perry

Preservation of CNMI History



For over a decade, Catherine Perry has hosted the Your Humanities Half-Hour (YHHH) radio program. A resident of the CNMI since she was ten years old, Perry says her interest in the humanities began when she developed a love of reading as a child. She is a Marianas High School alumna who went on to earn a Bachelor of Science degree in

Broadcasting with a concentration in Multi-cultural Studies from Evangel University in Missouri. In her time as the host of YHHH, Perry has interviewed over 500 people for the 30-minute on-air program. She sees the program as an opportunity to build understanding and synergy in the community. Her work has focused on creating a space comfortable enough for guests to share freely about the knowledge they hold. She considers herself a "facilitator of people's stories." She also hosts a live podcast on Facebook called Marianas Stories.

Preservation of CNMI History



Denton Pangelinan has been a professional photographer and videographer for four years. In that time Pangelinan has been an integral player in two projects centered on the humanities. He directed the film *Our Culture Will Heal Us*, which documented oral accounts of CNMI residents in the aftermath of Super Typhoon Yutu. He

also is currently in post-production of the film *Resilience and Reverence: Wartime and Women of the NMI*, a documentary that collects oral accounts of CNMI women who experienced World War Two. Pangelinan is of Chamorro and Palauan descent and was raised in the village of Dandan. Filmmaking for him is both a means of creative expression and an outlet for healing.

GOAL 1

Preserve and promote the indigenous languages and cultures of the Northern Mariana Islands (NMI).

The Chamorro people were the first inhabitants of the Mariana Islands. They lived together, in relative isolation from the rest of the world, attached to these islands and surrounding ocean for more than a millennium, speaking a common language and bounded by a culture embodying a unique set of customs, beliefs, and values. The Carolinian or Refaluwasch people of the Mariana Islands are descendants of people who immigrated from the Caroline Islands. Intermittent waves of people from the Caroline Islands sailed to the Mariana Islands beginning in the early 1700's and brought with them their own unique languages and cultures.

The Chamorros and Carolinians were subject to centuries of foreign colonial and religious policies and practices that systematically deprived these groups of the right to their own languages and heritage. "The indigenous peoples' languages derive and are also crucial to identity, culture, health, governance, socio-economic well-being, spiritual traditions, histories and philosophies" (UN adapted statement). For the indigenous people of the Northern Mariana Islands, the legacy of past colonial practices and the enduring influence of Western culture ever present in their homeland remain as imminent threats to the survival of their languages and cultures.

Objectives

- 1.1 Increase the practice and use of NMI indigenous cultures and languages in the public sphere.
- 1.2 Develop activities that celebrate the arts, music, history, and language of the indigenous people.
- 1.3 Increase the exhibition and interpretation of NMI indigenous cultural assets.
- 1.4 Develop programs that compare indigenous and non-indigenous accounts of NMI customs, traditions, heritage, and language.

GOAL 2

Develop and improve educational programs in literacy and language.

Literacy and language are essential to a community's ability to develop and empower itself. These communication tools help develop shared knowledge and critical thinking. The Council supports the reflection of our individual and shared values and beliefs that lead to constructive discourse. By supporting the development of literacy and language, we are directly helping the community navigate their own experiences.

The Council has invested significantly to improve family literacy in which adults and children interact through storytelling, reading, and writing. The Council is committed to evaluating its current projects and providing more educational opportunities that supports effective literacy and language programs.

Objectives

- 2.1 Create and promote a theme under the Community Grant Program to encourage sustainable educational projects that improve literacy and language.
- 2.2 Support the development of a Pacific Literature course
- 2.3 Evaluate and improve existing council projects that promote literacy.
- 2.4 Support the resource needs of the PSS Chamorro Carolinian Heritage Studies program.
- 2.5 Conduct writing workshops

GOAL 3

Increase publications and scholarship in the humanities.

Studying and documenting who we are leads to greater understanding and awareness of our contemporary issues and the world in which we live. Through the humanities, the Council is in a unique position to lead efforts to interpret human documents and artifacts and translate their value to society.

Objectives

- 3.1 Increase the research capacity among humanities practitioners and emerging scholars.
- 3.2 Examine contemporary issues in the humanities

GOAL 4

Promote the diversity of experiences and perspectives within the NMI.

We live in a world filled with diverse groups of people each with their own unique experiences and perspectives. As a neutral broker, the Council seeks opportunities to discover the marketplace of ideas and various expressions of identity that define us, empowering us to celebrate our differences.

Objectives

- 4.1 Introduce NMI indigenous languages and cultures to non-indigenous communities.
